Johan Grüno was a gold and silversmith from Hamburg.

This object is related, but probably not identical, to the Grüno cups sold by Rudolph Lepke in 1932, and at the 1937 Budge sale in Hamburg respectively.

The personal papers found in Cornelius Gurlitt's Salzburg home include a collection of about 2,400 photographs of artworks. Photograph no. 21.1_F2101 is an interior shot of the Gurlitt family residence in Dusseldorf, with this work and other objects displayed on a cupboard.
