### Note:

This plate is the first composition of *Femme au Cep de vigne*; four other variants are known. It was included in *L'Album des Douze Lithographies original de Pierre August Renoir*, published by Ambroise Vollard in 1919 in an edition of 1,000 (50 on Japan paper, 950 on velin).

This sheet originated in the collection of Otto Gerstenberg (1848 Pyritz–1935 Berlin). Gerstenberg was the director of the insurance company Victoria, and a prolific collector of art.

Having sold his important collection of old master prints to a consortium of art dealers in Zurich in 1922, Gerstenberg focused on his outstanding collection of German and French nineteenth-century art, including works by Toulouse-Lautrec, Degas, Delacroix, Daumier and others.

Following Gerstenberg's death in 1935, the collection passed to his daughter Margarethe Scharf (1889–1961).

During the Second World War, paintings from the Gerstenberg collection were deposited for safekeeping with the Berlin State Museums. In 1945, some works are known to have been transferred by the Red Army to the Soviet Union as so-called "trophy art"; many other works were destroyed during air raids.

According to a publication by Julietta Scharf (Margarethe's granddaughter), an impression of this same plate was included in an inventory of Gerstenberg property dating from 1943. That list is titled "Kist. t. K.", the meaning of which is unclear. Further research is on-going.
