Note:

According to Singer, the art dealer Fritz Gurlitt (Hildebrand's uncle) commissioned Klinger to make an etching after Böcklin's most popular painting, which Gurlitt released in great quantities. Gurlitt himself is said to have given the work its memorable title, *Die Toteninsel*.

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
